This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

### Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Burnt Oak Junior School, music lessons are timetabled across all year groups. We follow a personalised music scheme devised by the Music Subject Leaders at The Pioneer Academy, which is fully aligned with the National Curriculum for Music. This structured, progressive programme ensures that all statutory curriculum requirements are met. Evidence of pupil progress can be seen through classroom observations, online recordings, and our progression documentation.

Discussions with pupils show an increasing ability to recall key musical vocabulary, while observations confirm that all children – including those with SEND – are fully engaged and active during lessons. Our curriculum is enriched by a wide range of musical instruments that support hands-on learning. Daily music appreciation introduces pupils to a broad variety of musical genres and styles, encouraging active listening and thoughtful discussion. Teachers are confident in delivering musical content and in supporting pupils to listen to and appreciate different elements of music.

## Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Burnt Oak Junior School, we are proud to offer a wide range of opportunities for children to develop their musical skills. We hold regular singing assemblies where pupils learn and perform a variety of songs, participating with enthusiasm and confidence. All our Year 6 pupils take part in whole-class ukulele lessons each week and they showcase their learning in a performance.

Children have the opportunity to take part instrumental tuition and offer lessons in piano, guitar, and singing. These lessons are available to children from Year 3 to Year 6. Pupils receiving tuition are encouraged to join music ensembles outside of school, particularly through Bexley Music.

Burnt Oak Junior School has a long-standing tradition of participating in Young Voices, with a choir of around 40 to 50 children from Years 4 and 6 taking part each year. They also perform at The Fairfield Halls in Croydon with Bexley Music. Throughout the school year, pupils also enjoy participating in a variety of performances, including our Christmas production, music showcases, and singing in class assemblies, which are performed for parents and peers. Additionally, some of our pupils represent the school by taking part in music hub performances beyond the school setting.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At Burnt Oak Junior School, we make the most of our strong partnership with the music service to encourage young instrumentalists to progress into performing as part of ensembles. Parents and carers are highly supportive of our musical activities, and we consistently see strong attendance at school productions.

Music is enjoyed by both pupils and families, with a variety of themed and genre-based music played each morning in assembly to create a positive and engaging atmosphere.

We have also established a valuable relationship with the Bexley Music Trust. Musicians from Bexley Music have worked directly with our pupils and performed live in school, while also providing opportunities for Burnt Oak families to attend performances outside of school.

Our strong Social Media presence is used to celebrate musical achievements and signpost families to wider music opportunities in the community.

## In the future

In the coming years, we aim to further strengthen our music provision by reviewing and refining our curriculum and potentially buying into a scheme which can be accessed by non-music specialist teachers. We will continue to develop our school choir and support children in building their performance skills by creating more opportunities to perform throughout the year, both through our local music hub and within the wider community.

We are also committed to offering pupils more chances to experience live music performances and to fostering a strong pupil voice within our music provision. In addition, we will continue to invest in staff CPD to boost confidence and deepen subject knowledge across the school.
